#### **SEMINARIAN'S TAKE**

#### Merry Christmas!

Today, we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany of the Lord which marks the end of the Christmas Season. So today we celebrate the end of Christmas. Ever wonder why we celebrate the Epiphany? Or what the three kings are about?

Honestly, the three kings seem like an add-on at the end of the story of the Nativity, almost like an afterthought. There are the three kings no one has heard of showing up in the story and then they are never heard about or seen again; when they leave, what are they about?

The word "Epiphany" means *manifestation*, coming from the Greek word meaning "to show" or "to display." So, what is being manifested on the Epiphany? The Epiphany is about the manifestation of Jesus as the Messiah of all nations. This is really the key that explains the three kings.

There is not much known about the three kings or as they are also called, the three Magi. Magi could mean a member of the Persian priestly class or a wise philosopher. We do know that they were gentiles, which means they were not members of the Israelites or believers in the One God. While we don't know precisely who they were, we do know that the three kings represent other religions and philosophies of the world. Who they are is not as important as what they do.

These three men from different religions and worldly wisdom come and give homage to a child. Now, all of this is connected with the idea of the manifestation of Jesus as the Christ. When these three men come and worship the Christ Child, it is the first moment that Jesus is shown or manifested as the king of all nations, as the head of all religions, and as the author of wisdom. The Epiphany is the celebration in which the world sees Jesus as Messiah and Savior. These three kings represent religions and worldly wisdom and when they bow in worship before the Christ Child they show to the world the Messiah. It shows that all other religions must bow before the One True God; there is only one religion and one God who is to be worshiped. When they bow before the simple Christ Child, they show that all worldly wisdom and philosophy are nothing compared to the splendor of the God who is Truth itself; all worldly wisdom must bow before God, the author of wisdom.

Furthermore, when the three kings are depicted they are traditionally pictured as men of three different races, also men ranging in age from young to old. This is to show that the Christ Child is the Messiah and Savior of all races; He came for the salvation of all. The varying in age of the three kings shows that the Christ Child is King of all the ages.

The Epiphany, then, is about the Christ being made known as the King over all time, races, religions, and philosophies. As always, the question must be asked: What does that mean to me today?

This feast is about Jesus being shown as king. We must follow the example of the three kings. First, we must bow down in homage and worship the Christ Child as King. Secondly, like the Kings, we must offer gifts to the Child King. We don't need to offer Him gold and frankincense, but rather offer Him the gift that will show Him that you recognize Him as the king of your life. This gift could be an offering of your heart or it could be an offering of that one thing that you secretly hold as most important in your life. Whatever it is, the goal is that your offering becomes "a little" epiphany, that your gift to the Child King shows the world that Jesus is the Messiah.




