The first Christmas Mass of our parish was held at 12:00 a.m., December 25, 1844, in the first church. The first church was built in November of 1844. It was a one-and-a-half story building and was 18 by 24 feet. It stood at what is now 212 North Main Street. The upper part was the church and the lower part was Fr. Bredeick's home. SEMINARIAN'S TAKE

Merry Christmas!!!

Do you ever notice that there is a feeling of wonder around Christmas? As kids, this wonder was centered around Santa, gifts, and holiday decorations. As a child, I remember everything becoming almost like new every year around Christmas. I would get excited about the Christmas decorations, even though they were the same year after year. I loved to see the Church transformed on Christmas morning, colorful poinsettias everywhere, and the large nativity scene in the sanctuary with the little child Jesus in the manager. There was a special wonder about everything.

As we grow older, we cannot lose this wonder. The wonder we experience as a child needs to mature and grow with us. It needs to become deeper and fuller. As a child, the wonder we experience is because of the excitement surrounding Christmas; when we get older, our wonder should be because of what is hidden within Christmas.

How can our wonder grow deeper? By seeing what happened at Christmas with new eyes. Christmas is one of my favorite miracles in the Bible; the God who is the creator of the universe enters into the messy world of man. This is where true wonder is found. The reality of what happens at Christmas is astounding. We have been told the truth of the Incarnation since we were children, but I don't think we realize what that fully means for us. The reason we keep celebrating the birth of Jesus is that the wonder and power of that moment changes each one of our lives.

The Incarnation is about God choosing to enter into the world of darkness, sinfulness, and brokenness. God chooses to enter into this world for a reason. God entered into the darkness to bring light! He entered into the brokenness to heal it! He entered into the sinfulness to redeem it! The truth of Christmas is that Jesus did not enter the city of Nazareth just to redeem the kingdom of Jerusalem 2000 years ago; no, the truth is that He enters into our lives, and our hearts today! The truth of Christmas is that Christ came into the darkness, sinfulness, and brokenness to redeem it and make it new, and that is the truth for each of our lives. Christ came into our life to heal it and make it new. This is the hidden truth that gives us a deeper wonder, that God was born a man and that means something to us today. The Incarnation is real and it affects you and me. God comes into the mess of our lives and doesn't just get rid of our mess but to redeem it, to make it new. This truth should leave us with wonder. The thing in my life which is the most painful or troubling becomes through this Christmas truth something good and new. This is the hidden Christmas truth. God became man to save us from the mess of sin! This is the good news, this is why we rejoice, this is why we celebrate Christmas, this is why we still live in wonder! This truth of Christmas allows us to live in wonder and joy even when the world around us is messy and broken. We can live with joy and wonder because we believe that God will redeem it; we don't know how necessary or when, but we can live with the assurance that He will redeem it! This is what a deep wonder of Christmas is about. Its about living in a way that we see the world in a new way; we see the goodness of everything because we know that it will be redeemed and transformed by Christ. I encourage you to live with this deep wonder and joy that comes from Christmas. This wonder and joy is meant to be something that we live all year around not just at Christmas. "Do not be afraid! For behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people: Today in the city of David a Savior has been born to you. He is Christ the Lord!" (Luke 2:10-11)


