SEMINARIAN'S TAKE

Greetings all,

Have you heard the phrase "offer it up"? Perhaps when you were a child and you were forced to eat something you did not like and your parents told you "offer it up, there are people who are starving." Or maybe you heard it when you stubbed your toe; to "offer up" the pain. Or maybe there was something that was really annoying you and someone said "Just offer it up."

What is this "offer it up" all about? What are we offering up? Who are we offering it up to or for? Is it just a Catholic way to say suck it up and deal with it?

The truth is this phrase, "offer it up" has a lot of spiritual meaning behind it! Offering up has to do with sacrifice and Jesus' redemptive Cross. When someone says "offer it up," what they mean is: Take the pain, or that thing that you do not like, and transform it into prayer for someone else. You take the suffering and turn it into an offering (a gift) that can be united to Christ's suffering on the Cross. What is more is that you can take your suffering and turn it into a prayer for someone in need. Offering it up, or more officially referred to as "sacrifice" is a way to make meaning out of suffering.

Christ, on the Cross, takes His suffering and death and destroys sin with it, so that we can be saved. When we have suffering in our own life, we can take it and unite it to Christ on the Cross and connect it to His redemptive work. What that means in simple terms is that we can take our pain and suffering and use it as a way to save souls from hell. Suffering can now have meaning and purpose when one unites it with Christ's suffering on the Cross, using it as an offering to bring good to someone else. This happens all through Christ's suffering on the Cross.

This means the terrible things that happen in life no longer have the last say; bad things through Christ can be used to bring about God.

This "offer it up" is more than just the Catholic way of saying get over it! It's about taking suffering and using it to bring about good. Some people even take on small discomforts (Fasting) in order to offer that discomfort up for the good of someone else. This is called making sacrifices, taking on some small discomfort and connecting it to Christ on His Cross as a prayer for someone. While I encourage you to make small sacrifices like this, you also don't need to go out of your way to find discomfort! You can take the things that are frustrating in your daily life and turn them into a sacrifice. The next time someone is driving slow, the next time someone interrupts you, the next time you are stuck watching a TV show you dislike, it's an opportunity to offer it up!

THIS WEEK IN PARISH HISTORY By: Jack Bockey



The Delphos Herald from March 1, 1900, reported the following: "Sleet and Freezing Rain the Cause of It All:" "Even the clocks in the steeple of the Catholic church spire show the effect of the storm's doings. The rain and sleet beating against the dials froze to such a degree that the hands were interfered with and the clocks stopped at 15 minutes to 7 o'clock, presumably Wednesday morning.

In all parts of the city, limbs were broken from trees...and are hanging down far enough to interfere with pedestrians. The freezing of the slush Wednesday night, with the light fall of snow this morning has made good sleighing." Special thanks to Sam Bonifas for sharing this information!

When you have a drink of water, think about how your body needs water to stay alive, and how your




soul needs God's grace. Saying a prayer is kind of like giving your soul a little drink!



LIVING WATER

Reflection on John 4:5-42

Throughout John's Gospel, there are many scenes like the one today describing Jesus' encounter with the woman at the well, where there is so much going on behind the surface dialogue. John will often leave nameless the character whom Jesus encounters, inviting us to imagine ourselves in the role, receiving some certain gift, some truth, from the exchange.

This woman takes her bucket to the well, as no doubt she has done countless times, there to encounter Jesus who offers Himself as living water, welling up to eternal life. Here is where we might place ourselves in the story. To what "well" do I return over and over again to attain those things I think I need? Career? Wealth? Human affection? Sexual fulfillment? Pornography? Alcohol? Food? Social Media? Where do I go to get what I believe I need to be satisfied, to feel alive or whole?

Of course, Jesus proposes Himself as the true fulfillment of all that is needed or desired by us to be made whole, alive, and complete. But even more, in His encounter with the woman – and us – at the well of our obsession, idolatry, and sin, He reveals the depth of God's divine thirst for each of us. Jesus longs to share His life – welling up to eternal life – with us.
