THIS WEEK IN PARISH HISTORY By: Jack Bockey



On March 19, 1948, a tornado destroyed Landeck, St. John Church. Two boys were praying the Stations of the Cross and were on the 14th station when they heard the storm. Both were killed as a result of the storm.

The Delphos Herald from March 20, 1948, reported the

following: A double funeral service will be held Tuesday morning at St. John's Catholic Church in this city, for Norbert Bonifas and Gerald Kill, victims of the tornado which hit the Landeck church, Friday afternoon... Both boys were in the church at the time the tornado struck and were crushed as the entire upper part of the church caved in. A requiem high Mass will be intoned Tuesday morning at 9:30 o'clock at St. John's Catholic Church in this city. Burial will be made in the St. John's Cemetery at Landeck. Special thanks to Sam Bonifas for sharing this information! The 14th station was the only surviving station of the cross at Landeck. The same storm also destroyed Sacred Heart parish near Anna, OH.

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT MARCH 19, 2023

SEMINARIAN'S TAKE

Greetings folks,

One of the themes of Lent is the Desert. We hear in the readings about the Israelites wandering around in the desert for 40 years. At the beginning of Lent, we heard about Jesus going into the desert for 40 days and 40 nights. Early Christians would sometimes become hermits and live in the desert. So the desert is significant in the Christian spirituality. However, it's not the physical desert that is important, rather it's the spiritual desert that is important.

The desert spiritually has two significances in the spiritual life. Those significances are made clear if we look at why Jesus went into the desert. He went and was tempted by the devil. The desert is a place to do battle against the devil. This is one of the spiritual significances of the desert. A desert is a harsh place and so it was the arena to fight against sin and temptation. The desert is a place one can go to remove oneself from the things which cause one to sin; in a sense, stepping back from things in one's life that influence and draw one away from God. For the early Christians, that was the world, stepping away from the worldly noise that was drawing them away from God. So going into the desert was a way to do battle against the world, the flesh, and the devil; the three things which cause one to sin and abandon God.

The other reason that Jesus went out into the desert was to pray. Thus, the second reason for going into the desert spiritually is intimacy with God. The desert is a barren place. People don't often live in the desert so it is a place one can go to be alone with God. There we are not distracted by the world and the noise. When we step away from the busyness of life and enter into a spiritual desert, we can hear the voice of God better. The desert is thus about becoming closer to God.

Hopefully, you can see now why the desert is such an important spiritual theme of Lent. The desert is about fighting against sin and growing closer to God, which is the purpose of Lent. How can we thus bring this theme into our lives? Very simply, by carving out time in our day for silence. Spend 10-15 minutes a day in silence. This is harder than it sounds. In that time of silence, pray and listen for God's voice. I think when we take time away in silence, we can see our faults more clearly and see God's love more clearly.





Both families had hosted through St. John's previous exchange student program and both had positive experiences. The Bonifas's shared, "We felt that a whole year would give a young person a great experience, as by December they are just really starting to make great connections." The Benfield family added that, "Now the exchange is for the school year and the exchange students can be involved in everything just like any other student. " Both families agreed that they wanted to provide a home for a student who wanted to come to Delphos. Without families, we have no place for these students.



What hesitancies did you have and how have those changed?



Both families were concerned about no longer having their own children at home; however, both have found that this was not an issue. They enjoy being around high school students and making sure their student was involved in school life! "These students are just excited to come to America and are happy anywhere," added Area Rep Lynette Haehn. Angie Bonifas added, "Another hesitancy is always will the student fit in and make friends? I feel that more often than not, these kids wouldn't be doing this program if they weren't able to assert themselves to some point." But she also encourages people to read the bios to get a good feel for the student.

exciting experience for us. The excitement begins with choosing your exchange student from a long list of available students and wondering all about them and their families." They added, "We learned many things about our student and their country, their customs, family life, government, sports, schools, and food and drinks, and he has been extremely interested in learning about the United States and our culture as well." Finally they said, "We treat our exchange students as if they are our own child; same rules, same chores, etc. Our experience has been fulfilling." The Bonifas's said, "We are having a very positive

exchange experience hosting a student through ASSE. We were careful to choose a student that we felt fit well with our personalities and interests, and mature enough to be in our home even though we do not have high school children." They added, "We were very committed to making sure the student is involved as much as possible at school, and is able to attend any events and activities so they can truly experience typical student life in the US. We are finding that our family members enjoy getting to know her and have her around as well, and we are trying to give her a few experiences / trips to get a feel for the US outside of our small rural area. She has been active in dance, volleyball, and now wants to do track with her friends."



What would you tell someone who is considering hosting an exchange student?



Angie Bonifas said, "Do not feel like you have to have the perfect space, the perfect family, or have travel plans every weekend! They really want to experience normal family life here, and just providing a clean comfortable space is really the expectation." The Benfield's shared, "Keep an open mind to host an exchange student. If you enjoy adventure try being a host family. It is like going on a vacation without leaving home. Hosting is a two way street where the host family and the student both learn."

Both families stressed the importance of communication. Bonifas said, "Like anything, good communication is important, and can make or break a student's experience here. We are finding that even though there are differences in language, food, and some customs, we are really more alike than we are different, and it is super fun sharing and discovering these things." Both families also shared how these can be lifelong relationships! Past exchange students have been like "bonus sisters" and "bonus kids."

RECEIVING HEALING


Reflection on John 9:1-41

In today's Gospel, John offers another dramatic story describing the healing of a man born blind and a range of responses to this healing. The experience of healing itself involves both the action of Jesus – using mud and spittle to smear on the man's eyes – and the response and cooperation of the man who must go and wash in the pool of Siloam, which means "sent." With physical sight restored, and spiritual sight awakened, this man is now "sent" as a witness to Jesus.

But look at the reactions! Accusations of sin all over the place. Mistrust, denial and division among the religious leaders. Too frightened of the controversy to get involved from the parents. Confusion from neighbors. What do we make of all this?

Jesus, the Light of the World, came to dispel darkness and sin. How do we experience and receive this healing for ourselves and others? Do we see reality with the eyes of faith when the Light of Christ exposes falsehood and reveals truth that is uncomfortable? Are we at times so comfortable with our blindness that we prefer ignorance over enlightenment? These are all good questions, prompted from the Gospel, for us to consider during this Lenten journey.


